About the Study

Durham University is undertaking research into people's experiences of power cuts and extreme weather as part of the interdisciplinary **SAT-Guard** project. SAT-Guard aims to improve the resilience of the energy system to extreme weather and enhance support for communities impacted by power cuts.

Social science researcher **Dr. Danielle Johnson** is seeking to understand how the priorities and realities of people living with OCD can better guide preparation and response to power cuts by emergency management groups, practitioners, and utility companies.

Who Can Take Part?

You are eligible to participate if you meet **both** of the following criteria:

- **Condition:** You are living with OCD and/or other mental health conditions.
 - **Location:** You currently live in Northeast England.

What Does Participation Involve?

- **Format:** A 1-hour interview focused on your expertise and lived experience.
 - **Topics:** We will discuss the impact of power cuts and extreme weather on your household, your household's readiness, and what appropriate support looks like for people living with OCD and other mental health conditions.
 - **Compensation:** As a small token of appreciation, interviewees will be offered a **£15 voucher**.
